“There would be absolutely no way that I would be able to live in my own home on my own if it wasn’t for NewBridge,” said Mary, a 90-year-old Morris County resident, who has relied on NewBridge SAIL for nearly a decade.

Mary could consistently count on. A widow, Mary has been a NewBridge SAIL- Senior Assistance for Independent Living -client since 2001 when her grandson called to see

how NewBridge could help his grandmother stay in her own home.

NewBridge answered the call and ever since has helped Mary receive financial assistance for home health services and energy bills. While she initially needed limited home health services, she now requires 7-day-a-week care. Thanks to NewBridge, she was able to tap into a state program to receive 5-6 hours of care a day, every day from a certified home health aide. The aide comes to Mary’s house every day, makes her breakfast and a hot lunch, shops for her food and tends to her living needs. When Mary

Alternative Education Gives Father Hope

Daughter thrives in NewBridge 70001 Jobs Plus

When Francis' daughter, Lucy, dropped out of high school in 2008, the family needed options. But with alternative education schools closing in record numbers in recent years, he was not optimistic that he would find an academic fit for his teenager.

NewBridge Partners with Town to Achieve COAH Credits

NewBridge continues to make affordable housing a reality for Morris County residents. This time, thanks to \$164,114 in funding from the Mount Olive Municipal Housing Trust Fund, the current NewBridge affordable housing initiative in Mount Olive will expand from four to seven units.

“NewBridge has a long track record of working in partnership with local municipalities to meet the needs of their residents,” said Melody Federico,

Director of Housing Development, NewBridge. “These new units not only give Mount Olive state-mandated Council on Affordable Housing (COAH) credits, more importantly, it makes affordable housing a reality for three more Morris County families.”

The new rental units serve parents with special needs and their children. To date, NewBridge has created



25 units and has another 36 in development. NewBridge continues to work with

local municipalities and relies on partnerships to deliver on its mission of creating 100 new affordable housing units by 2010.

New Program to Address Growing Community Need

Morris County, NewBridge assists those with mental illness, substance abuse

NewBridge continues to expand its program and service offerings to meet the ever-changing needs of the community. Thanks to support of the Morris County Department of Human Services and the Morris County Chosen Freeholders, NewBridge was granted \$39,000 to fund a new enhanced outpatient service.

“The county and NewBridge have recognized for a long time that these services are needed,” said Jenn Carpinteri, Addictions Services Administrator, Morris County Department of Human Services. “We are pleased that the county can support this initiative and are confident in NewBridge’s ability to offer a program that will meet the increasing needs of county residents.”

The new program, which provides wraparound case management services, is designed to further help someone dealing with substance abuse and mental illness successfully manage their life. It goes beyond traditional counseling to include services such as assessments, counseling, transportation assistance and help in securing government assistance.
